Introduction and Table of Contents



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The first <u>Disability in Higher Education Summit</u> was held at the MSU Kellogg Hotel and Conference Center in East Lansing on September 20, 2024. Sponsored by the Office for Civil Rights and Title IX Education and Compliance's Office of the ADA Coordinator; the University Health and Wellbeing's Resource Center for Persons with Disabilities (RCPD); MSU Libraries; and the Office of Employee Relations, the summit served as a cornerstone event that highlighted MSU's commitment to accessibility, equity and inclusion across its campus and community.

The summit featured a keynote address by Jay Dolmage, founding editor of the Canadian Journal of Disability Studies and a leading advocate for disability rights. Dolmage challenged attendees to rethink accessibility in higher education, emphasizing that "disability is a culture, not a separate group." A student panel brought firsthand experiences to the forefront of the conversation and shared challenges, such as facing skepticism when requesting accommodations or navigating spaces unprepared for service animals.

The summit agenda featured three breakout sessions on topics including neurodiversity and unapparent disabilities; fostering disability identity in higher education; and exploring campus career accessibility and supporting employees with disabilities.

180 people attended the Disability Summit in person and over 120 people attended virtually.

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Jay Dolmage is the Founding Editor of the highly impactful Canadian Journal of Disability Studies. Winner of the 2015 PROSE award, Dolmage's work brings together rhetoric, disability studies, and critical pedagogy, in an accessible yet ground-breaking body of articles, talks, and workshops. A fierce advocate for disability rights, Dolmage is committed to publishing Open Access and accessible material and helped to author the international guidelines for accessible electronic books. -Office of Civil Rights
