

COUNTERING IDENTITY-BASED HARM, DISCRIMINATION, AND HATE AT MSU

Last updated: September 2025

Identity-based harm refers to hurtful experiences based upon a part (or multiple parts) of someone's identity, such as race, religion, ethnicity, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, or disability. It can be caused by acts that are verbal, physical, written, or digital and can occur at the individual/interpersonal level and the institutional/structural level.

Identity-based harm can be caused by prejudice, hostility or unjust treatment toward race, color, and/or national origin (including shared ancestry and caste), such às:

Anti-Blackness (Black identity)

Antisemitism (Jewish identity, Judaism)

Islamophobia/ Arabophobia (Muslim, Arab identity)

University Response for Potential Discriminatory Harassment vs Protected Speech

Potential Discriminatory Harassment

EXAMPLES

- Slurs, threats or intimidation
- Patterns of offensive jokes/symbols/treatment targeted at individuals
- **RESPONSES**
- Investigation under the Anti-Discrimination Policy Potential sanctions, outreach and support,
- prevention and education
- Potential law enforcement referrals for hate crimes
- Monitoring patterns of harmful behavior

Protected Speech

- Personal opinions
- Non-disruptive protests
- Academic debate
- Controversial symbols
- Support for those impacted by harm Evaluate need for public response
- Education
- Tracking to inform strategic climate efforts
